

The Soldier's Cross or Battlefield Cross

The Rifle: with Bayonet affixed, is the most important tool to a United States fighting soldier. It is the core to their livelihood and key to their survival.

It is thrust into the ground signifying that the one being remembered died in battle, fighting to the end. It also signifies that the battle is over when the rifle is left this way.

The Boots: carry a service member through the fight for our freedom. They are the first and most important means of transportation. The boots are laced at the base of the rifle. They are worn and dirty reminding us of that final march to the last battle.

Dog Tags: are worn by each service member. They have imprinted into them, all of the important identifying information regarding that individual. The dog tags are hung from the rifle, so that the name of the fallen will never be forgotten.

The Helmet: is an important piece of protection on the battlefield. Some believe that the hat or helmet of the individual represents what that person stood for. It is placed on the rifle signifying the battle is over and a great sacrifice was made. It will never be worn again.

The Cross: stands for a tribute and a memory as we honor and never forget.

The Story of the Poppy

The poppy flower only grows in the absence of other flowers and only in ground that has been churned. In perhaps the best known poem of World War I, when Dr. John McCrae observed poppies growing between the crosses on the soldiers' graves, it inspired him to write the poem In Flanders Fields. The poppy has since become known as "The Flower of Remembrance" and is worn in memory of our veterans.
